

JAPAN'S CUTTING-EDGE ULTRA HIGH DEFINITION 8K TECHNOLOGY TO SUPPORT THE PRESENTATION OF MAD'S EXHIBITION, JAPANESE KŌGEI | FUTURE FORWARD

NEW YORK, NY, October 16, 2015 – The Museum of Arts and Design, the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications, and the Agency for Cultural Affairs of Japan are pleased to announce their collaboration on the occasion of the exhibition *Japanese Kōgei* | *Future Forward* on view from October 20, 2015 to February 7, 2016, which presents the work of 12 established and emergent *kōgei* artists, and examines the changing role of this discipline within Japanese culture today.

A prototype 8K display with wide-gamut, currently the only one on view in the United States, will be displayed in the *Japanese Kōgei* galleries from October 19, 2015 to December 7, 2015 and utilized to showcase the incredible skill and artistry of the works exhibited in intense detail and lifelike video.

Allowing for a resolution of about 33 million pixels—16 times higher than current digital TV High Definition broadcasting standards—the 8K technology renders extraordinarily clear and vivid images and will be used to complement the experience and understanding of the *kōgei* art works for museum goers.

"We are honored to collaborate on this project with the Agency for Cultural Affairs and the Ministry of Internal Affairs and Communications from Japan" stated Nanette L. Laitman Director Glenn Adamson. "The experience of looking through an exhibition case can at times be less 'intimate' than what can be experienced through the astoundingly vibrant resolution of 8K. The technology was interesting for us as another touchpoint of encounter for visitors, further illuminating the techniques and artistry at play."
